After awareness drive, police to challan vehicles for not using side-view mirrors

CHANDIGARH POLICE will start a challan drive for not using sideview mirrors. The decision was taken by the traffic advisory committee in July, 2018, against motorists.

Driving any motor vehicle including, two-wheeler and fourwheeler, without side-view mirrors on the both the sides of vehicle is an offense under Motor Vehicle (MV), Act, 1988 and it carries a fine of Rs 300.

Apolice officer said, "This offense falls in category of miscellaneous offences but we are yet to start a challandrive, especially focusing on this offence.

DSP (traffic) Amrao Singh, said, "Before initiating challan drive for not using side-view mirrors, we want to conduct an awareness drive throughout Chandigarh. Majority of people are not aware about the fact that not using the side-view mirrors is also a traffic offense. We are following a strategy of conducting awareness drives about particular offences first and then we will start a challan drive for those traffic offences. The awareness drive will start shortly. The road accident analysis wing of traf-

fic police also observed that in several road accidents, most of the vehicles involved do not have side-view mirrors, which are a compulsory accessory."

As per the official statistics of challans of motor vehicles in Chandigarh, 49,000 challans

out of 1.99 lakh, were issued only for not wearing helmets against two-wheeler riders in 2018.

Meanwhile, 111 motorists have been challaned for honking at three health institutes including PGIMER, GMCH-32 and

GMSH-16 since December 5, 2018. The challan drive for these offences began after a sixmonth long awareness drive. The UT traffic police had distributed lakhs of stickers urging people to not honk unnecessarily. During the drive, traffic police had included volunteers and school students.

A police officer said, "At present, we are challaning the people only inside health institutes. We will start challan drives around educational institutes soon as well."

Now, clampdown on two-wheelers in city

WRONG PARKING: Traffic cops challan 29 in Sector 34

After four-wheelers, the UT traffic police have now started clamping wrongly parked two-wheelers in the city.

Around 29 two-wheelers parked wrongly in Sector 34 were clamped today.

ASI Sarwan Singh of the Traffic Wing, who had in the recent past clamped a vehicle of Punjab and Haryana High Court and an SUV owned by the husband of a Punjab MLA, led the drive in Sector 34 and clamped two-wheelers.

The police said Sector 34 was one of the sectors where wrong parking was rampant. The situation turned worse when two-wheeler riders also park their vehicles on the roadside, causing traffic jams.

"Two-wheeler riders earlier used to think that they cannot get challaned for wrong parking, However, they will also be penalised for the violation now," said a police official.

The traffic police in the past have conducted massive challaning drives against parking on roads in various sectors, especially on lanes opposite markets.

A traffic cop said violators were large in number and sometimes, they even fell short of clamps.
